Typology of definitions of online participation according to its six main issues

The question of online participation is linked to six main issues

- Political
- Educational
- Epistemic
- Marketing
- Media
- Economic

Typology of user figures according to the issues of online participation

Issues of online participation	User figures
Political	Citizen vs politician
Educational	Learner vs tutor
Epistemic	Professional vs amateur.
Marketing	Prosumer (consumer and producer of content at the same time)
Media	Produser (user and producer of content at the same time); co-designer, co-developer
Economic	Data provider, contributor

Distinction between "participation" and "contribution" in the world of digital communication

- Contributions correspond to the type of "active" participation: forms of engagement of the "visible" type in the participatory public space.
- Participations correspond to the two kinds of "passive" and "active" participation, and thus to "invisible" and "visible" forms of engagement.
- ➤ So, "participation" includes "contribution"; having a broader meaning, the term "participation" can therefore replace "contribution" in all contexts.

Relationship between digital discourse analysis and online participation analysis: digital discourse is part of online participation

- **Digital discourse analysis** is particularly interested in dealing with analysis data from a technolinguistic interactionist approach.
- Online participation analysis often tends to study data through a communicative and sociological approach that deals with social, economic and political mutation.
- Some studies related to online participation can go beyond the interactionist analysis of the contents of the statements.

Technodiscourse is one form of online participation
